ELIZABETH (BETH) HICKS - 1916-2018

Founding Member, Life Member



It is with sadness that we announce the death of Beth Hicks in her 102nd year. Beth and husband had a large family and ran a farm in Waupoos and were actively involved in community activities. In the latter part of her life, Beth resided at Trent Valley Lodge, Trenton.

Beth Hicks together with 5 other women founded The Prince Edward County Quilters' Guild in 1986 and she was actively involved in the guild for several years.

Beth's reputation as an exceptional and talented quilter had made her known as "The County Quilter". From the 1940s through to the 1980s the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto invited quilters to submit quilts for display, and prizes and ribbons were allocated. Over the years Beth Hicks was the recipient of many such awards; her work was beautifully executed and her colour sense exquisite.

In 1996 The Amazing Loyalist Adventure was introduced as a 3 day County event that ran successfully every September for the next 10 years. Organizations, businesses, farms, museums, schools and churches all participated. The purpose was to highlight and honour the spirit of the County's Loyalist Heritage.

The guild participated the opening year, The Crystal Palace was rented and old quilts were collected from throughout the County. Beth Hick's large collection of quilts contributed to the success of the display, which was further enhanced by attending guild members wearing period costumes.

Our 2002-04-06 Quilt shows featured a display of antique and earlier quilts to which Beth again provided a large selection, which garnered much interest and admiration.

In 2002 the Guild held a Celebration in honour of our Founding Members and Beth together with other founding members was granted a Life Membership.

An old fashioned quilter, who did both hand-piecing and hand-quilting, which sadly is also becoming a dying art form.

Beth will be missed by all her quilting friend and family.

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Quilt Show 2018 - Judged Quilts

Each quilt show our guild has a judged section for quilts. Our guild retains a professional certified judge.

Why enter the Judging Section?

The judge provides positive and helpful feedback on abilities & creativity to the quilter.

The judge will use the following criteria to evaluate your quilt.

You will receive the Judge's written critique and comments about your quilt.

The judge will use the following criteria to evaluate your quilt

Visual Impact

Overall Appearance & Design

The overall appearance & design attracts attention with design, colour & techniques that come together for an overall positive statement - the "wow factor." Design of the top, quilting, fabric choices, sashing, borders, imagery, and finishing are well planned and integrated. Line, shape, colour, texture and value are effectively used to produce an interesting balance and well-proportioned design. The layout of all blocks, borders, sashes & bindings on the quilt look as if they belong together. The quilt design is unified. The quilting pattern complements the top design, fills the spaces well and is consistent in proportion to the top design elements.

Materials are suitable for the design & function

Fabric and colours are suitable for the design with respect to scale of the fabric, value and balance. Batting is distributed evenly and suitable to the technique, with no bearding (batting pull through to quilt top or back).

Binding is appropriate to the design of the quilt.

Quilt lies/hangs flat

There is no rippling, puckering or stretching; no wobbles or distortion on the front or back.

Quilt is neat & clean

Quilt is neat, clean and "show ready" with no visible markings, loose thread, bearding, soil, pet hair, odour or stains.

Workmanship/ Techniques

Seams - construction is smooth and well stitched with no puckers. Seams are cleanly pressed with no thread showing. There is no shadowing of dark fabrics under light.

Piecing - intersections meet evenly and are flat. Points are sharp, & curves are smooth. There is no shadowing of dark fabrics under light.

Applique - appliques are securely attached without puckers, using matching thread. Stitches should be hidden unless stitches are decorative. Curves are smooth and points sharp, with no shadowing of dark fabrics under light.

Embellishments, Surface Design - embroidery, embellishments, beading, overlays, trapunto, photo transfers, etc. should be secure, neat, effectively executed and appropriate to the design.

Binding - is neatly & securely stitched. Binding is consistent and filled consistently. Curved corners flow smoothly, square corners are 90 degrees.

Quilting - stitches are even and consistent with balanced tension front & back, no knots or thread build-ups. Design marking lines are not visible. Stitches on the back of the quilt are neat and as even as those on top. Thread tension is even. Amount of quilting is sufficient and appropriate for the design of the quilt top with the consistency of quilting stitches reasonably maintained throughout.

The following are the categories for our quilt show.

Quilts for Judging

\$10. fee for each entry, entrant will receive a written criteria form from the Judge

Novice

- only 2 categories (1) wall quilts (2) bed quilts
- novice is a member who has not entered a quilt in a judged quilt show and placed 1st
- any member who has none of the credentials as listed in Advanced Level

Advanced

- any member who has previously placed 1st in any quilt show
- teaches classes and/or shows or sells work outside of PECQG Quilt shows
- any quilter who elects to enter Advanced level

Wall Quilts Categories *no size requirements*

Wall Quilt Traditional - a quilt created by entrant using traditional style piecing and / or applique, using blocks in the public domain.

Wall Quilt Abstract - a quilt created by entrant using shapes, textures, colours, lines.

Wall Quilt Representational - a quilt created by entrant depicting landscapes, portraits and pictures that are fairly accurate and realistic

Wall Quilt Pattern/Book - a wall quilt made from a pattern, book or workshop. Must credit author of pattern/ book

Bed Quilts Categories

Sizes from crib to King (*no specific inches*)

Bed Quilt * Original Design * Hand Quilted - a functional bed quilt, hand quilted by entrant from their own original design

Bed Quilt * Pattern, Book or Workshop * Hand Quilted - a functional bed quilt, hand quilted by entrant made from a pattern or book. Must credit author of pattern or book

Bed Quilt * Original Design * Machine Quilted - a functional bed quilt, machine quilted by entrant from their own original design

Bed Quilt * Pattern, Book or Workshop * Machine Quilted - a functional bed quilt, machine quilted by entrant made from a pattern or book. Must credit author of pattern or book

Bed Quilt * Original Design * Third Party Quilted - a functional bed quilt top by entrant from their own original design. Quilted by other than entrant - quilter must be acknowledged


Bed Quilt * Pattern, Book or Workshop * Third Party Quilted - a functional bed quilt top by entrant made from a pattern or book. Must credit author of pattern or book. Quilted by other than entrant - quilter must be acknowledged

Notes for Judged Entries

- no restriction of number of entries in each category
- ribbons prizes will be awarded in each of the categories for 1st 2nd & 3rd at the discretion of the judge
- misrepresentation of a quilt entry may result in changing the category or elimination from judged section

Swiss Cheese Potato cake

From the kitchen of: Mary Andrews Minigan

Ingredients:

Butter, potatoes, swiss cheese, vegetable bouillon

1. Melt 2 Tbsp butter in the bottom of a 9x13 pan.
2. Thinly slice 5 or 6 medium potatoes (russets are good). Coarsely grate swiss cheese to make 1 1/2 to 2 cups.
3. Layer potatoes then cheese alternately.
4. Pour 1/4 cup of veggie bouillon over all.
5. Bake covered with foil at 400 F for 45 mins or until potatoes are virtually done. Remove cover for 15 minutes more until nicely browned.

Taco Salad

From the kitchen of: Penny Hopkins

Ingredients:

1 lb lean grd. beef
1 pkg. taco seasoning
1 cup water
1 bag plain nachos or Fritos
1 head iceberg lettuce
3 medium tomatoes
1-1/2 cups grated cheddar cheese
Catalina or California salad dressing
Brown beef and drain well. Mix in taco seasoning and water and simmer 10-12 minutes.
Tear lettuce into bite size pieces and mix with diced tomatoes. Add meat and cheddar cheese. Add salad dressing to your liking. Break the tortilla chips or Fritos into small pieces and either add just before serving or serve in a dish on the side so they stay crunchy.
Note: Can also add black beans, kernel corn, peppers, etc.

Spanish Chicken & Fried Rice (Party Dish)

From the kitchen of: Greta Khristiansen

Ingredients:

4 lbs boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut in cubes
Coating Mixture:

2 tsp dried oregano, 2 tsp salt, 1/2 tsp pepper (if short make more.)

Wash chicken, pat dry. Sprinkle with coating mixture, rub in well. Let stand 10 minutes

- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 1 green pepper, thinly slivered
- 2 cups chopped onions
- 1 clove garlic, finely chopped
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/8 tsp crushed red pepper
- 2 cups long grain rice
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 1 -28oz (796 ml) can diced tomatoes
- 1/2 cup sliced black olives or slice pimento stuffed olives
- 1- 4oz can pimentos
- 1/2 package (10 oz size) frozen peas

Pre-heat oven to 350F. Heat oil in large frying pan or Dutch oven, brown chicken pieces, lift out and drain as browned. To same oil add peppers, onions, bay leaf and dried red peppers. Cook until onions are tender, about 5-6 min. Add rice and stir until rice is browned, about 10 min. Add chicken broth and undrained tomatoes. Bring to a boil uncovered, remove from heat and pour into a large baking dish. Arrange chicken pieces on top. Cover tightly with foil and bake 1 hour. Remove from oven.

Do not stir. ***

*** Add 1/2 cup water. Drain pimentos and cut in 1/4 inch strips, arrange over rice. Sprinkle with olives and peas. Bake covered 20 minutes longer. Remove from oven. Let stand 10 minutes covered.

Hahahaha. That's my kind of recipe!



Have you been stitching items for sale in the boutique? Now is a good time to work on a few projects before spring clean-up in the garden distracts us. If you are cleaning cupboards, remember that books and magazines were very popular sales with our Quilt Show visitors in 2014 & 2016.

Guild members who have submitted items in the past will find two minor changes to the procedure for submitting items in 2018:

All items will be priced at \$3.00 or more. Bundling of items such as books and magazines is a good strategy. You may decide to price your bundle at \$3, \$5 or any amount you choose. The total of items submitted by a member will not exceed 75.

If you're a new member, we welcome and encourage you to submit items for sale in the Boutique. Our visitors love to shop! We sell fibre related items made by members as well as quilt related books and magazines. A deduction of 15% of your price will be charged. Items accepted in the Boutique are fibre related such as placemats and other quilted items, knitted and crocheted items, hand embroidery, aprons and more. Low cost items sell more readily.

The procedure for submitting items will be emailed in May along with the inventory form that you will bring when you submit items. Members should keep a copy of their inventory. At our Quilt Guild meetings in May and June, we will have zip lock baggies with price tags and "new material labels" as provided in the past. Stickers for books will also be available for pick up.
